## PUBLIC ABSTRACT

Fever Dreams: Butterfly Chasers, Pollinators, Sun Gazers, is a series of paintings and artist books that build a world, magical and real. This world explores identity, sexuality, human futility, anxiety, passion, love. Figures and landscapes merge with Razzle Dazzle patterns—a curious camouflage, a mask. Heat intensifies color and figures find themselves and loose themselves. We are spectators.

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#### **PREFACE**

I'm interested in spaces maximized with day-glow colors, patterns, and plants inspired by my hot and sticky homeland. These dense spaces simultaneously comfort and spur anxiety.

Figures camouflage into the landscape around them-- they blend with their surroundings naturally or take on Razzle Dazzle characteristics with complex geometric shapes and contrasting colors, full in spectrum, that vibrate off the landscape.

Occasionally adorned with flower collars and patterned skin, figures reach out – in hopes of catching butterflies, in the warmth of another's hand, tender noses extend—ready to pollinate. These actions are both external and internal: figures reach into themselves, deeper and deeper, connecting to their unconscious— earnestly unearthing psychological terrain accessed as frequently as the flickering light of the sun beaming into the bottom of a well.

When figures find themselves occupying such a space-- one both familiar and estranged-the excess within the landscape flows into excess of action. The landscape initiates this action
and figures respond intuitively-- sometimes by indulging in a picnic and other times in vice. Here
we stumble upon complex moments that examine abuse, passion, femininity, sexuality, violence,
impulse; motives uncertain, rights and wrongs are displaced and challenged. Post-action and
post-figure, the landscape holds secrets and absorbs the aftermath of intensity-- attention
diverted, ambiguous space mirrors ambiguous motives. The futility of human action at its finest.

I think in words, in stories, in places transcending our own: liminal and intersexual. My hopes are to explore different chapters and stories of this world in paintings, artist books, and soft sculptures. Excavate the complexities of this Queer Space—delicate as a butterfly's wing, constant as the sun, and rooted in mystery.

The air is hot. A fever. A rush of light. Heat intensifies color. Figures are threaded together into a landscape inundated with pattern— *Razzle Dazzle*—skin, comfort, camouflage.

I think of liminal and intersexual spaces—spaces where light intensifies in a fever of color—fearless and fierce; subversive and seductive; daring in full spectrum; a *Queering of Space*. And of *Swamplandia*—wandering around the mangroves and cypress trees; identifying flower friends; believing in a space other than our own; the trauma, the world warping, an inability to identify the familiar— A dizzy spell.

Isolated figures reach out in search of touch and comfort—a task of transformation—a symbol of bravery. They find themselves with growing noses—maybe they sang too many stories; chased one too many butterflies; or maybe they're so accustomed to drinking sweet nectar that their bodies are adjusting.

Romping around—digging deeper into the flowers. They love. They drink. They chase and dance and make whoopie. They loose themselves and find themselves. Digging deeper and deeper—wells—what's at the bottom? I think about being at the bottom of the well and waiting for that instant of flickering light as the sun moves past. *The Wind-Up Bird* unwound.

The Wasteland, a world is stitched together by fragmented stories. And the moment in IQ84—looking up at the sky and spotting two moons; wondering if they've always been there; wondering if anyone else can see them too; watching the news and searching for hints of this

new phenomenon; the moment of realization that this new moon is there, really there, but alone, distant, and unknown by most; holding this new moon, and digging deeper into a world of our own.

Paintings, artist books, and soft sculptures are tools to explore this world with which I discover different chapters and stories within.

Digging. Searching. Staring at the Sun.

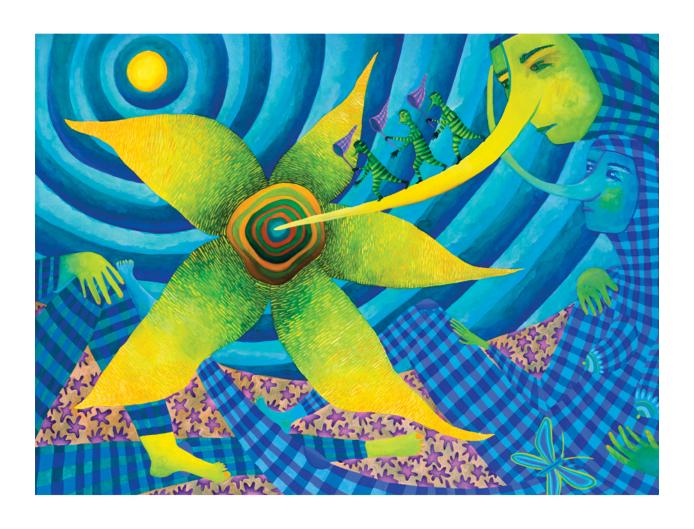


Figure 3: *Pollinators* | gouache on paper | 22 x 30" | 2020

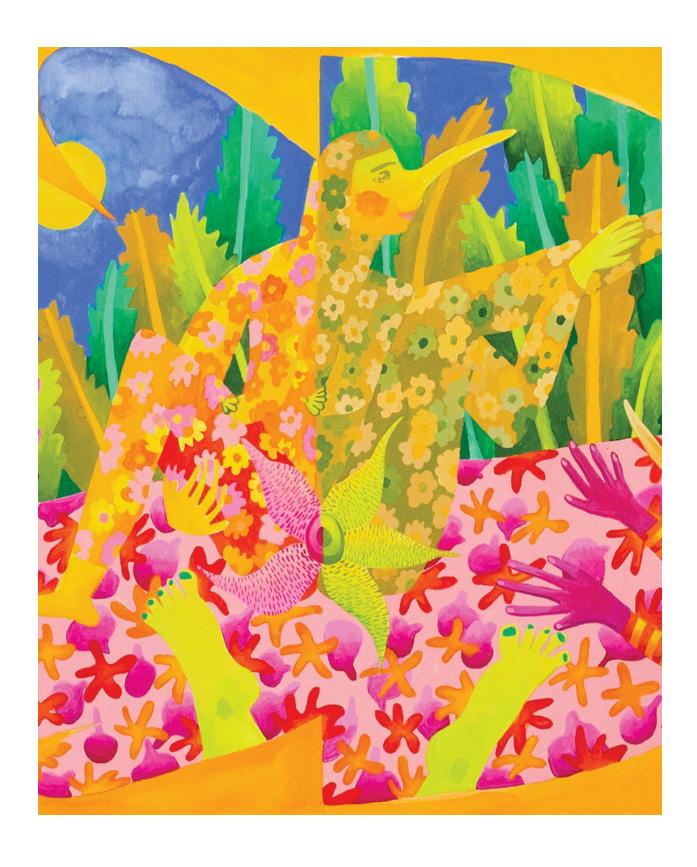


Figure 4b: *Moonlight Bloom* | detail

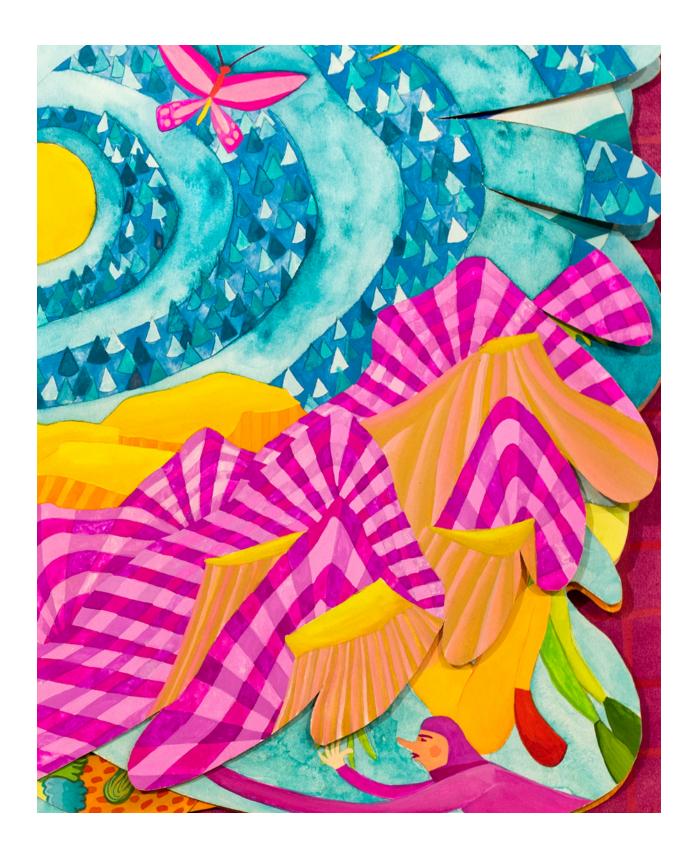


Figure 15: Butterfly Sighting | detail of 1r

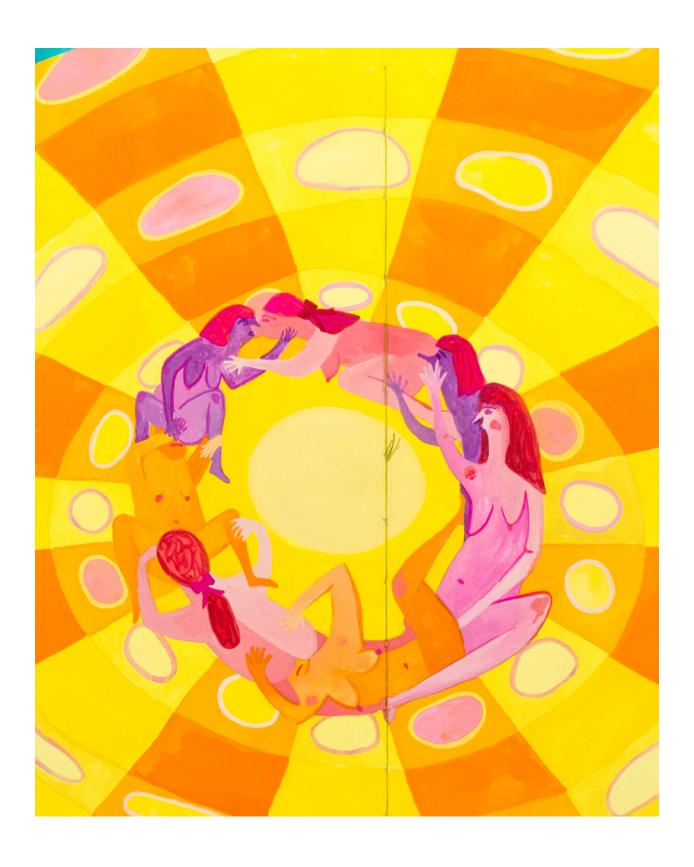


Figure 16: *Butterfly Sighting* | detail of 4v and 5r

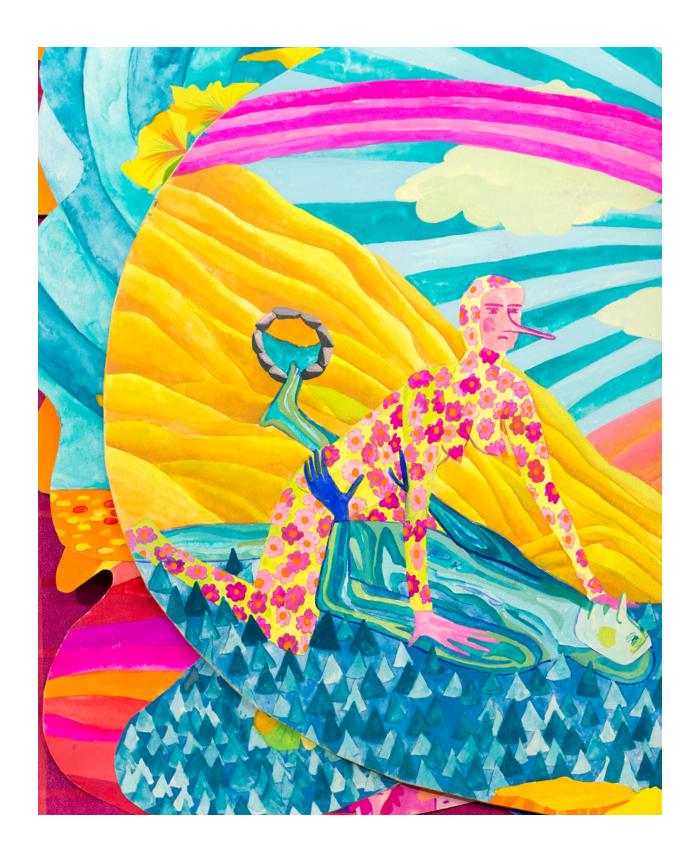


Figure 17: *Butterfly Sighting* | detail of 5v

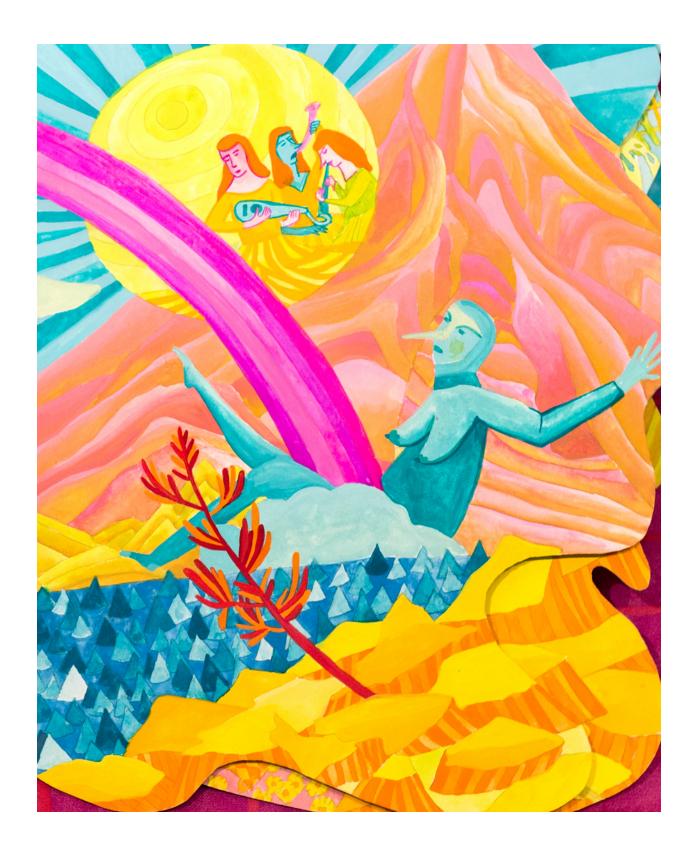


Figure 18: *Butterfly Sighting* | detail of 6r

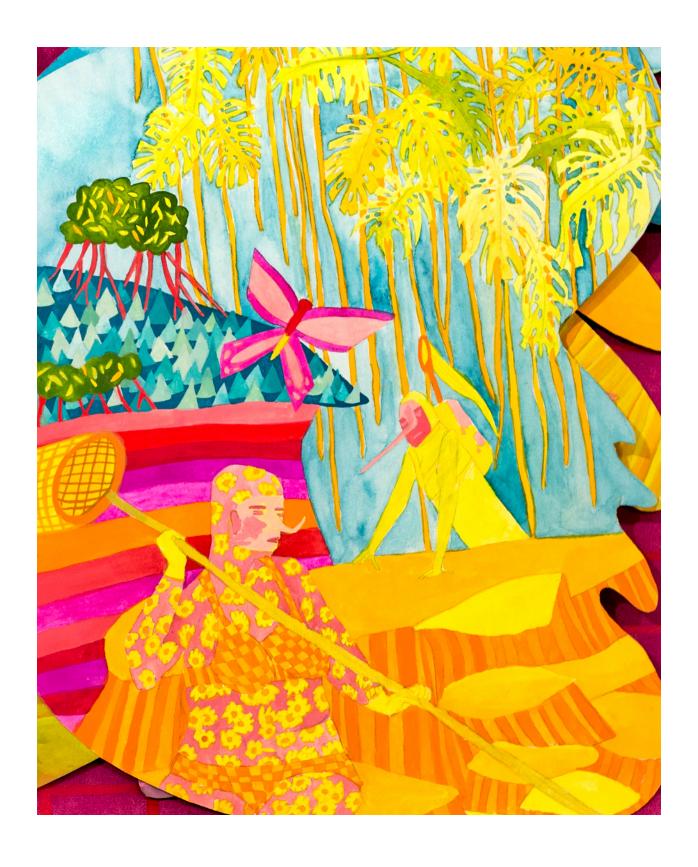


Figure 19: *Butterfly Sighting* | detail of 7r

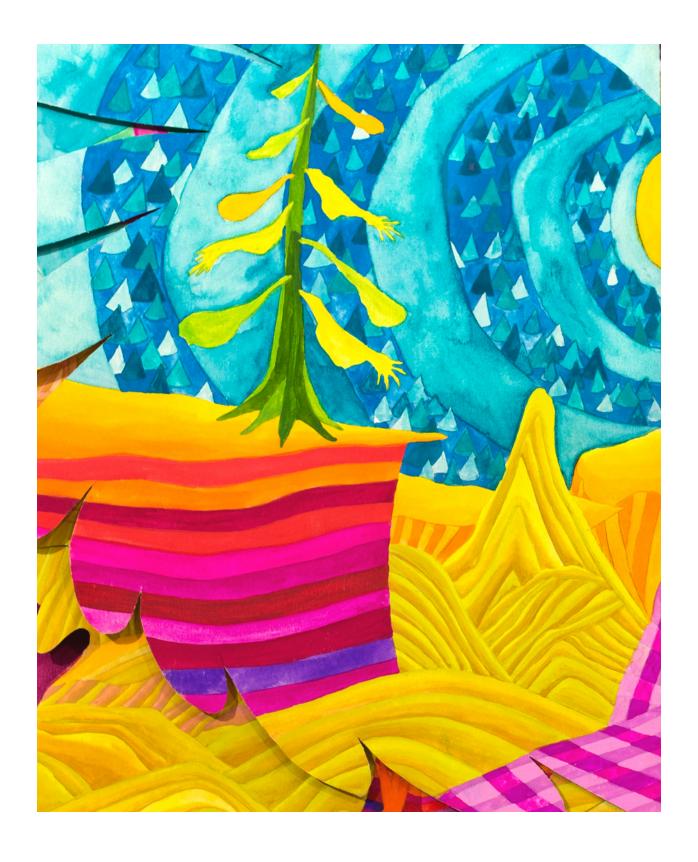


Figure 21: Butterfly Sighting | detail of 8v

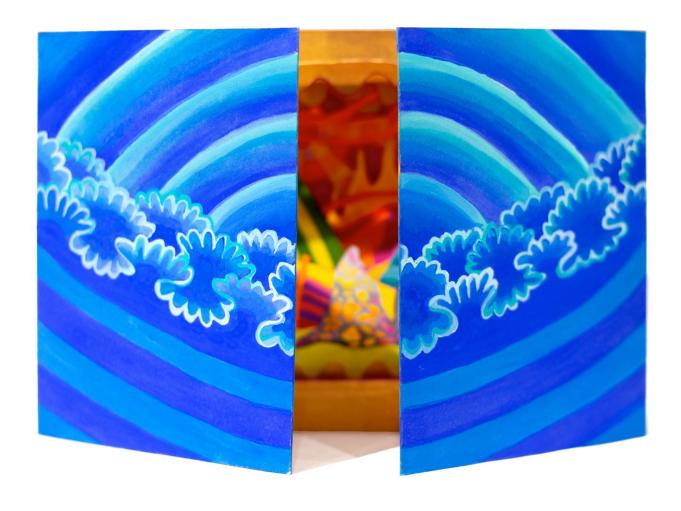


Figure 22: *The Chase |* detail of front doors

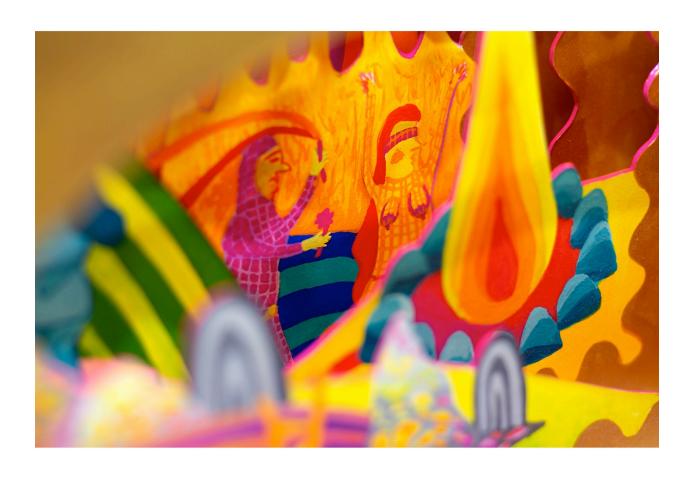


Figure 23b: *The Chase /* detail of tunnel

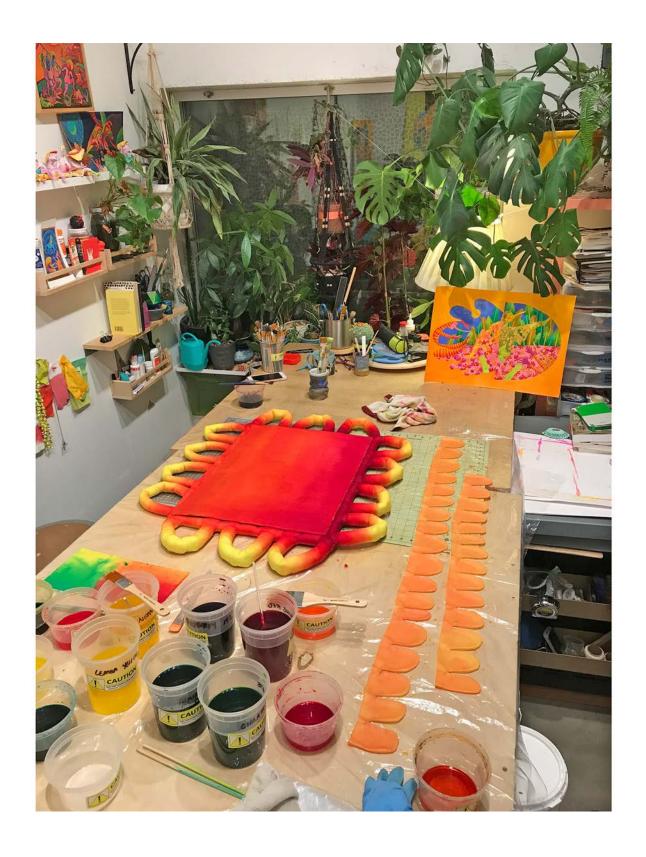


Figure 29: Studio View
